

Kinderhook Welcomes the Shaker Museum

The Shaker Museum of Chatham is partnering with the Kinderhook Knitting Mill on the opening of a new community-based exhibition space at 4 Hudson Street, 2nd floor. According to the museum, this exciting addition to Kinderhook's cultural scene "enables the museum to deliver more programming and access to the collection to wider audiences, even while its new permanent home is in development."

The museum's first exhibition, entitled *Shades of Shaker*, debuted Saturday, December 3, 2022, and will be on view until February 25, 2023. The exhibition features the showing of more than twenty historical objects exploring the bold use of color in iconic Shaker design.

Exhibition hours are Fridays and Saturdays, 10am to 6pm, and Sundays 11am to 4pm. The exhibition is free to the public, and people with disabilities may access the space via elevator.

Economic Development Projects & Grant Updates

NY Forward and NY Restore. In Fall 2022 the village applied for a \$2.5 million NY Forward grant. Award announcements are expected early in the new year. The village also submitted an "Intent to Apply" application for a second grant opportunity called NY Restore.

Local Waterfront Revitalization Plan (LWRP). The villages of Kinderhook and Valatie are joint recipients of a grant from the NYS Department of State for the preparation of an LWRP. The initial kick-off meeting with the two village's LWRP committees and the engineering firm Barton & Loguidice took place in the first week of December 2022. Public engagement is a vital component of the development of the LWRP. Both committees encourage residents to get involved and provide their input. Watch for future notifications of upcoming public meetings.

Village of Kinderhook GeoTourist app. Supported by a Grant from the Hudson River Valley Greenway - Maurice D. Hinchey Hudson River Valley National Heritage Area. After more than two years of development, a GeoTourist app illuminating the cultural history of the Village Square and select surrounding sites is ready to launch. While the Dutch children of Kinderhook spent early December waiting for the arrival of Sinterklaas and his presents and perhaps dreading his partner Zwarte Piet, Palatine children, their neighbors to the south were awaiting an entirely different entity. They were awaiting Belsnickel.

Belsnickel was the traditional visitor for the Palatine region. Belsnickel was a crotchety old man in dirty furs of some kind. Sometimes he wore animal hides, sometimes a cloak decorated with fur. Sometimes he wore a mask to disguise his face. Occasionally his hood or hat was decorated with antlers. He carried a sack of treats and a stick because Belsnickel was both the gift giver and the punisher as opposed to separating the roles as Sinterklaas and Zwarte Piet did.

There are a few versions of what would happen upon Belsnickel's arrival. First, he would rap on a window or a door with his stick before bursting into the house. The children of the house would then be lined up. In some houses they were quizzed, asked to recite a verse from the bible, sing a song or tell him something learned in school. If they were able to answer the question, they were given a treat. If they couldn't answer the question Belsnickel gave them a whack with his stick. This ensured that children were paying attention to their lessons. In another version of the legend, he would throw candy on the ground, if the children grabbed for the candy before he gave permission, he would give them a whack or two with his stick, whatever it took for them to back away from the candy. This version of the legend taught the children not to be greedy. After the treats or discipline were delivered, Belsnickel would rush out the door and disappear as quickly as he had appeared.

The specifics of the origins of Belsnickel are hidden in the mist of time. Belsnickel probably dates back to at least the Middle Ages. Bels is probably a corruption of "Pelz" the German word for fur or pelts, "nickel" probably relates to St. Nicholas. As mentioned by before he sometimes wears horns which could indicate a pagan origin of the character.

The Belsnickel tradition continued in some families in the Hudson Valley into the twentieth century. In Pennsylvania Dutch country and in parts of Indiana the tradition is still going strong. Belsnickel has also seen a resurgence in pop culture in recent years.

So, this December if you hear a rapping on your window make sure to check the door, Belsnickel may be coming for a visit.

Moving Forward With A Plan

HVEA has been Awarded the Albany Avenue Pedestrian and Bicycle Improvement Project for the Village of Kinderhook – This firm has a separate Regional Design Service Agreement in Region 9, Poughkeepsie, NY to provide services to local municipalities.

The Village of Kinderhook selected HVEA for this 2-year term agreement to provide consultant design services encompassing the following tasks: Preliminary and Detail Design Services, to Evaluate if there is a need for Right of Way Incidentals and Right of Way Acquisition, and to Provide for Construction Management Oversight Services to include; Assistance to Select Construction Contractor (s) and Inspection Support Services for the Albany Avenue Pedestrian and Bicycle Improvement Project: NYS DOT PIN 78762.83.

The Village of Kinderhook intends to utilize a project steering committee to provide oversight for this Project. Their role will include:

- Provide guidance to the Village of Kinderhook Project Manager and Mayor on all aspects of how the design and construction serves the residents and our stakeholders.
- Ensure continuing alignment with Village of Kinderhook's goals and priorities.
- Communicate with the Village Board and other participating Village Committees/ Commissions and residents as deemed appropriate.
- Ensure the necessary Village of Kinderhook staff resources and other subcontracted resources and materials are available at critical points to meet agreed upon schedules.
- Ensure that unintended consequences and project activities are minimized and that the project impacts are fully understood by the Village of Kinderhook board, residents, and stakeholders.
- Review and provide feedback on project plans, approaches to work and detailed work plans.
- Make decisions on critical issues and /or approaches to project execution.

A REMINDER ABOUT SNOW REMOVAL

<u>Clearing Sidewalks</u> - All properties adjoining a sidewalk are required by Village Law to remove snow and ice 24 hours after the snowfall has ended. The **full width** of the sidewalk must be cleared to allow people with disabilities to be able to pass through. If the snow and/or ice are not removed, the Village may hire a contractor for the removal of the snow and ice chargeable to the property owner.

The cost of the removal and a \$15.00 processing fee will be billed. Please make every effort to clear your sidewalks of snow and ice.
