

## **CLIMATE SMART COMMUNITY TASK FORCE**

The Village Climate Smart Community Task Force (CSCTF) was established by the Village Board of Trustees in 2016 to consider initiatives that may be suitable for Kinderhook under the Climate Smart Community (CSC) program sponsored by New York State Department of Environmental Protection. The program's purpose is to provide local governments with guidance on how to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, save tax dollars and advance community goals for health and safety, economic development, energy independence and quality of life.

The CSCTF is an advisory group of resident volunteers and Village Trustees. Our broad focus has two main objectives:

- 1. Providing educational events and regular communications that offer practical ideas and information to community members on what each of us can do to preserve and improve our environment.
- 2. Working with the Village Board to foster environmentally sound policy and actions.

Recent accomplishments and ongoing efforts:

- The Village was designated as a NYSERDA Clean Energy Community (CEC) in 2019 after completing four action items. Completion of these items resulted in grants totaling more than \$50,000 to be used for energy efficiency and greenhouse gas (GHG) reduction projects. In 2021, NYSERDA initiated a CEC Leadership round from which we hope to receive additional funding for sustainability projects in the Village. We have now completed six action items by recently achieving success in our Community Solar Campaign. At this time more than forty households and businesses have signed up with our partners in the campaign, Astral Power and Solstice. By reaching our goal, the Village is eligible to receive a grant of \$5,000 from NYSERDA and additional donations to a sustainability fund by both Astral Power and Solstice.
- In 2021, the Village's electric vehicle charging station (EVCS) usage accounted for a reduction of more than 4.3
  metric tons of GHG. Since its installation in 2019, usage of our EVCS has resulted in an estimated 5.9 metric ton
  reduction in GHG emissions.
- As part of our continuing collaboration with the Kinderhook Memorial Library, "Bat Week 2021" was held at the library. It was a great success! During the week, 30 kids stopped in to make bat crafts, go on a bat scavenger hunt, and learn some bat facts. Family participants made bat houses with the help of Tom Messina who volunteered his time in preparing materials and assisting the builders along with the Teen's Librarian Matt Pavloff. Mandy Babirad, the Children's Librarian, also purchased 20 new bat books for the library collection, 15 of which came from funds provided by the Climate Smart Task Force. At the time of this report, all the books are checked out.
- We are conducting a battery and small electronics recycling program called the "Big Green Box" in partnership
  with the Library. Boxes are available at the Library and the Village Hall. You can drop off used batteries and
  unwanted cell phones at either site.
- We continue to publish updates of our activities and achievements on the Village website and in the quarterly Village newsletter. We also regularly post environmental information and tips on sustainability on local social media outlets like Nextdoor Kinderhook and IMBY.
- Plans for solar installations on two municipal buildings have begun. Sun Common won the bid for the work. The
  majority of the cost for this project is covered by a grant we received in 2019 from NYSERDA under its Clean
  Energy Communities program.
- It is expected that all municipal electrical service will "go green" in 2022 with the Village's agreement to subscribe to a community solar program with NEXAMP.

Thanks to the ongoing support of the Village Mayor and Trustees, the Task Force volunteers continue to look into additional actions that will promote sustainability and lead to the Village being designated a **Certified Climate Smart Community**. With that certification, the Village will have additional opportunities for grants from New York State for future environmental projects.

The Task Force meets regularly on the second Tuesday of the month at 7PM. Martin Van Buren was born at the start of the Christmas Season on December 5,1782 in Kinderhook, New York. America's eighth president, Martin Van Buren, battled a devastating economic contraction throughout his four-year tenure. There is no record of Van Buren sending White House Christmas cards and very little is written about how America's first Dutch president and his family celebrated the holiday during those trying times. Van Buren's most enduring Christmastime contribution is that he chose the color of the décor for the White House State Room(which became known as the Blue Room, and has maintained the same hue ever since), where the official Christmas tree would come to be placed and holiday celebrations would be held each year.

Throughout his life and presidency, a number of important and sometimes historic evets took place during the Christmas season. Van Buren assumed the governorship of New York one week after Christmas of 1828. As payback for a political feud with Vice President John Calhoun, his appointment as U.S. Minister to Great Britain was overturned by Congress exactly one month after the Christmas of 1831. In his First Presidential Address to Congress, at the beginning of the 1837 Holiday season, Van Buren called for the establishment of an independent treasury to combat the deep banking crisis. Then, four days after Christmas, the "Caroline Affair" took place when Canadian troops seized a U.S. steamboat which had been leased to Canadian insurrectionists. One American was killed. A week later, the president issued a proclamation warning U.S. citizen not to assist in the Canadian revolt and dispatched Federal troops to the Maine border. For the next few holiday seasons, no White House Christmas cards were sent to the Queen of England (Canada was still a British colony). Later, one day after his final Christmas in the White House, tensions with Great Britain eased when Alexander McLeod was found no guilty of murder. McLeod, a Canadian had been arrested in New York for his involvement in the Caroline Affair.



## Know Your Neighbor Joan M Quilty

When Joan moved to the Village of Kinderhook, it reminded her of where she grew up. There was an air of peacefulness about the Village and the residents were nice.

Joan was the girls' softball coach at Croton High School where she held the best one season record at the high school level of 13 wins and 0 losses. As a volunteer, Joan has worked at the Sylvia Center at Katchkie Farm, Kinderhook Meals On Wheels, Columbia Land Conservancy, Cornell Cooperative Extension and with the Here 4 You volunteers, for the Food Drive Table that benefits the Valatie Ecumenical Food Pantry. Additionally, Joan volunteered to assist the team at St. John The Baptist Church in Valatie with the sanitizing of the church on Saturday's during the Covid-19.

Although Joan is not a sports enthusiast, she is a "die hard" Boston Red Sox fan and her memorabilia collection backs that up. Joan's taste in music favors Rock N Roll and her favorite artists are the Beatles, John Mellencamp, Bruce Springsteen, Tom Petty and U2. Her hobbies include baking, cooking, and gardening. When we asked Joan about her favorite movie, she replied without hesitation, the Star Wars franchise, and the Harry Potter Franchise. Joan also listed Katherine Hepburn, Martin Short, Steve Martin and Robin Williams as her favorite actors.

# Shrubs & Trees Oh My!

As a Trustee for the Village of Kinderhook, I have been assigned as a liaison covering Trees in the Village. What I have come to know is that Village residents love their bushes, shrubs, and trees.

The Village code covering this subject was originally written in 1992 and subsequently updated in 2002 and may need updates to cover our present conditions. This being said - and after doing some research on this subject, I feel that before any discussion of updating the code is conducted that maybe a majority of us tree, shrub and bush lovers should agree to a few high-level principals and then Develop – goals, objectives, and actions – Some draft Principles follow:

PRINCIPLE #1 As an equal part of the Village's infrastructure, this "green" infrastructure that constitutes our urban forest contributes positively to the health of all residents and is a valued and shared resource.

PRINCIPLE #2 Guide and promote a sustainable urban forest through education, incentives, and regulation for environmental, social, and economic benefit of Village residents and business owners.

PRINCIPLE #3 Develop an adaptive and flexible management approach that allows for changes in response to new information on or new circumstances.

PRINCIPLE #4 Balance the needs of the Village as a whole (the public at large) with the needs and desires of individual residents and business owners regarding the Village's urban forest.

PRINCIPLE #5 Recognize the urban forest as a critical local municipal asset and infrastructure component through a long-term commitment to proactive management and adequate resource allocations within Budgets.

## Shop Local and Support Kinderhook's Revitalization

The revitalization of Kinderhook's historic business district made significant progress during the spring and summer of 2021, with major construction underway on multiple development projects and new businesses getting ready to open. On Hudson Street and Broad Street, the transformation of two of the village's most significant historic structures is well underway. And an exciting slate of new retail businesses will join Kinderhook's collection of existing and new businesses in the New Year.

## Around the Square

- Gallery Northeast opens its third exhibition on November 20, 2021, featuring the paintings of Melanie Stackhouse.
- This fall the Old Dutch Inn and Three Sisters Tavern on Broad Street received a bright new color palette.
   According to HPC member Randal Dawkins, "pink was very chic and popular throughout the 19<sup>th</sup> century."
   Major interior construction on the inn has been completed, and attention is now focused on interior finish-level applications.
- Morningbird, Coffee, special pastries and a lunch menu are now available Thursday through Monday from 8am to 3pm and Tuesday and Wednesday from 8am to 2pm.
- Nest, a lounge bar nestled next to the main dining area of The Aviary a full-service restaurant and event space located in The Kinderhook Knitting Mill are projected to open in spring of 2022. Watch for the launch of The Kinderhook Knitting Mill website.
- OKPantry, featuring home goods, international treats, kids' accessories, and a penny-candy stand and soda fountain, is located at 2 Hudson Street. Opening night is Friday, December 3<sup>rd</sup>, during Candlelight Night festivities.
- The Kinderhook Knitting Mill project will also be welcoming **September Gallery**, formerly of Hudson, to the third floor at 3 Hudson Street. September Gallery will be exhibiting contemporary visual artists from the US and abroad.
- The Kinderhook Bottle Shop, a wine-and -spirits store to be located at 8 Hudson Street in The Kinderhook Knitting Mill, is working toward opening this winter.
- Two Note, a scent and fragrance maker and retail shop that's expected to open this coming spring, will
  also be coming to 8 Hudson Street.

## PREPARING FOR WINTER

Living in the northeast, we all know that the beautiful season of fall is followed by winter. It is important to prepare for the impending cold and snow. Listed below are some ideas to help you deal with the demands of winter weather.

☐ Get your furnace cleaned to increase efficiency and prevent carbon monoxide poisoning.			
Test smoke and carbon monoxide detectors and change batteries.			
☐ Maintain a supply of non-perishable food and bottled water to last several days in case you lose power or can't get to a store.

☐ Pack a flashlight, back-up batteries, radio, and warm blanket in your car in case you get stuck.			
☐ Install snow tires and top off winter windshield solution to melt ice.			
☐ Keep your cell phone charged, especially when venturing out in a car.
